This investment will enable us to deliver a modern, engaging, and therapeutic environment, designed to support not just academic progress but also the emotional and social development of our students.

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
#### **Embedding the 7Cs at Great Howarth**

#### A Framework for Communication, Compassion and Care

At Great Howarth, we are always looking for ways to deepen our understanding of the needs of our pupils and to create an environment where every young person feels safe, supported and understood. One of the frameworks that has become an integral part of our practice is **7Cs** - a trauma-informed, relational approach that helps guide both our thinking and our actions.

#### What are the 7Cs?

The 7Cs are a set of seven key principles that underpin relational and therapeutic practice. They are:



#### Why do we use the 7Cs?

Our pupils often come to us with experiences of trauma, disrupted relationships or unmet needs. The 7Cs give us a shared language and approach that prioritises emotional safety and relational repair.

Rather than focusing solely on behaviour management, we use the 7Cs to understand the 'why' behind behaviour, and to respond in a way that builds trust and connection.



#### What's the impact?

For staff, the 7Cs offer a consistent framework that reduces reactive responses and promotes a calm, reflective culture across the school. Staff feel more confident in supporting needs and complex more connected to their colleagues through shared values and collaborative practice.

For our pupils, the benefits are profound. They experience adults who 'stay with them' in moments of crisis, who genuinely listen, and who hold high expectations while offering unconditional positive regard. Over time, this helps pupils develop emotional regulation, build resilience and re-engage with learning and relationships.

"The 7Cs have transformed how we understand and respond to our pupils. It's not just about supporting academic needs - it's about meeting emotional and sensory needs too. When we lead with compassion and curiosity, we unlock potential in pupils who have previously felt unheard or unseen."

Sofi brings a wealth of experience in supporting pupils with **Autism Spectrum Condition (ASC)** and is passionate about creating engaging, structured and nurturing environments that allow all children to flourish.

She is trained in and specialises in two highly effective approaches for supporting autistic learners:

◇ TEACCH – This is a structured teaching approach that helps pupils feel safe and secure through the use of visual timetables, clear routines, and well-organised learning spaces. It reduces anxiety and promotes independence by helping pupils understand what's expected and how to achieve it.

◇ Attention Autism – A fun and interactive programme designed to develop attention, communication, and turntaking. Using exciting, visually stimulating activities, Attention Autism builds pupils' ability to focus and engage in group learning.





Sofi is also a Professional Development Consultant in Numicon, a visual and hands-on resource that supports pupils in mathematical understanding Numicon concepts. uses colourful shapes and patterns to help children see and feel numbers, making maths more accessible and enjoyable for all learners.



We are so pleased to have Sofi on board. Her calm and caring approach, combined with her specialist knowledge, is already making a big impact with our youngest pupils.

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## Preparing for the Future: Work Experience at Great Howarth

This term, we have been incredibly proud to launch our **Work Experience opportunities** for some of our secondary pupils. It's been a real highlight of the term, with young people stepping into new environments, developing vital skills, and starting to imagine a future beyond the classroom.

For all young people, the transition from school to adult life can be daunting - but for pupils with additional needs, it can feel even more complex. That's why meaningful, well-supported work experience is such a valuable part of our offer at Great Howarth.

Work experience gives our pupils the chance to:

- **Develop practical skills** that are directly transferable to the workplace
- Build confidence and self-esteem by succeeding in a new setting
- Understand expectations around professionalism, timekeeping, communication and teamwork
- Explore different career paths and find out what they enjoy
- Strengthen their independence and decision-making skills





For pupils with SEMH (Social, **Emotional and Mental Health)** other needs, autism, or additional needs, these opportunities can be especially powerful. The structure, purpose, and sense of achievement gained from work experience can boost motivation and self-worth, and help our young people picture themselves as capable and employable individuals.

As we look to next term and beyond, we plan to expand our work experience programme even further.

Our goal is to ensure that every young person at Great Howarth has the opportunity to develop their skills, aspirations and confidence in the real world—no matter their starting point.

We're not just preparing pupils for employment.

We're helping them believe they have a future where they can achieve.
