Horizon-Blocks is a new therapeutic initiative launched across Horizon schools. Delivered through weekly group sessions, students work together to build with blocks while developing key social and communication skills such as turn-

taking, listening, problem-solving, and teamwork. Led by trained staff and supported by Horizon's Therapeutic Services team, the programme provides a calm, structured space for





students—particularly those with SEMH needs—to grow confidence, build peer relationships, and develop emotional resilience through purposeful play.
